Lesson Title: A Breakdown of Human Trafficking

Instructional Time Required: One Class Session

Lesson Objectives: Students should be able to:

- Define human trafficking.
- Understand the difference between sex trafficking and labor trafficking.
- Explain what the Action-Means-Purpose (AMP) Model is.
- Give examples of where labor trafficking takes place.
- Give examples of where sex trafficking takes place.

Lesson Overview:

This lesson starts with learning about what human trafficking is and understanding the difference between the two types of trafficking- sex and labor trafficking. Students will learn some very significant data about human trafficking to understand the seriousness of this crime. Students will learn about the Action-Means-Purpose (AMP) Model, which can help us better understand the federal law for human trafficking. Under this model, the trafficker takes ACTION (transports, recruits, provides), then employs the MEANS (force, fraud, coercion), for the PURPOSE of compelling a victim to provide labor or a commercial sex act. Students will watch a video called “What is Human Trafficking?” created by the Department of Homeland Security, which dives deeper into what human trafficking is. Students will learn about where human trafficking occurs the most for sex trafficking and labor trafficking. Students will watch a video called “I’m gonna make it’- Stories of Child Trafficking from Survivors” created by Love146. We recommend the discussion that follows, it can be very powerful if teachers spend a decent amount of time discussing the questions in detail with students.

Key Terms in Lesson:

Human trafficking- the use of force, fraud, or coercion to obtain some type of labor or commercial sex act.
